

HISTORY IN THE VALE – Newsletter 1

Events taking place **1st May – 31st October 2024**

Here is all the information we (at Vale & Downland Museum) have received from local history societies, village museums and archivists, who were invited to a second 'History in the Vale' meeting in Wantage on March 20th.

East Hendred Heritage Trust

Hendred Museum at Champs Chapel, Chapel Square, East Hendred has reopened its doors for the 2024 season. It will be open to visitors every Saturday and Sunday afternoon, 2.30 – 4.30, until the end of October.

Come and visit our **current exhibition** from the series "The Street where you live" which features St Mary's Road. This exhibition looks at the history of events and the lives of the people who have lived there over the last 150 years. It contains some fascinating information and is well worth a visit.

The historic building which is home to the Hendred Museum is a small stone chapel which dates from 1453 when a group of Carthusian monks from the monastery of Jesus of Bethlehem at Sheen in Surrey arrived in the village. The building alone is worth a visit without seeing the artefacts and collection of photographs that the museum cares for, which relates to the village of East Hendred and the surrounding area. Hendred Museum is one of the smallest accredited museums in the country.

This year the museum trustees are organising their bi-annual fundraising **Open Gardens** event on **Sunday 9th June**, 11.00 – 5.00, where 20 village gardens are open to the public. This event enables the many to see what normally only the few will see - what lies behind the garden wall! Afternoon tea will be available from Hendred House, and the pubs will be open for lunch.

St Augustine of Canterbury's faceless clock is one of the oldest working tower clocks in the country. In 2025 the clock will have been marking time in East Hendred for 500 years. The clock was designed and installed by renowned clockmaker John Seymour of Wantage in 1525. It sits in a small room up in the bell tower with an equally precious large mechanical music box known as a carillon. The original mechanisms in both the clock and the carillon are still intact and until 2015 were working until the carillon broke and the clock stopped working. After extensive restoration which it is hoped will be finished in time for its 500th anniversary St Augustine's clock will again be alive and ticking! The clock rings out the hour using the tenor bell and the quarters using the treble and 2nd bell. It also sounds out canonical time at 3.00, 6.00, 9.00 and 12.00. After the canonical hour has been chimed it uses all six bells to play the 'Angels Song' by Orlando Gibbons. St Augustine's Church and Clock Tower will be open to the public for tours as part of the Open Gardens Day on 9/6/24.

Royal Army Chaplains' Museum



The Royal Army Chaplains' Museum, Faringdon Road, Shrivenham SN6 8EU tells the story of British Army chaplaincy from earliest times to the present day, with the help of archive material and historical relics from several centuries. Its collection is dedicated to the work of Army Chaplains throughout history in peacetime, under fire, and in captivity.

Admission is free and opening times are Monday to Friday, 1330 – 1700 or by prior arrangement.

Her Royal Highness Sophie, Countess of Wessex, whose great-uncle won the Victoria Cross as a padre in World War One, officially opened the new Royal Army Chaplains' Museum, at Shrivenham, Oxfordshire in May 2022.

During a tour of the museum, the Countess was shown an exhibit dedicated to her great uncle, Noel Mellish, who was awarded the VC for his actions in rescuing wounded soldiers from no-man's land in Belgium, in 1916. Three soldiers were killed while he treated their wounds but he saved more than 20 lives.

Visitors to the museum will be able to:

- See how clergy have accompanied the Army in times of war and peace.
- Hear how padres have guided and cared for the troops.
- Explore how, during difficult times, soldiers have wrestled with religion and belief.
- Remember and reflect on the biggest issues of life in the military.

The museum seeks to promote public understanding of the place and value of religion and belief in the military and to play a full part in Shrivenham life by hosting visitors to both the Defence Academy and the Armed Forces Chaplaincy Centre. Although an Army Museum, it portrays Faith in the Forces for all branches of the military.
